INVENTING AND CREATING

Marco Polo Class

What a fantastic and productive week we've had in Marco Polo class!

In Maths, we recapped how to write algebraic expressions and tackled multiplying and dividing by decimal numbers with great success. English focused on different types of unreliable narrators, exploring their purposes in storytelling, and we also practiced writing cliffhangers to build suspense.

History was hands-on and strategic as we studied the Spanish Armada's tactics and applied our knowledge by creating and playing our own board games based on the strategies used. In Life Skills, we held a fundraising bake sale for Make-A-Wish, and we're so grateful for all your support—thank you.

In PE, the children applied everything they've learned to play some incredibly successful games of Capture the Flag,

showing fantastic teamwork and strategy. DT was all about planning, as we designed our own desk/drawer organizers, which we will begin making next week.

Geography took us to high-altitude locations, where we explored the effects of oxygen deprivation and wrote diary entries imagining we were explorers scaling Mount Everest.

Okapi Class

This week in Okapi class has been a fabulous one, with the arrival of spring and two days of sunny weather, which brought great joy as the young people played outside. We have been exploring "if you were an engineer what would you do?", focusing on problem-solving and thinking critically about existing products and how they could be improved. They have been tapping into their creativity, imagining new solutions to everyday challenges. In science this week, the young people participated in an investigation focused on transpiration (uptake of water in a plant). They explored how food colouring demonstrates the movement of water through a plant, causing the petals to change colour as part of the process. The young people made predictions about the outcome and will observe the results in the coming days to see if their predictions were correct. Additionally, the class had a special visitor who taught them valuable first aid skills, including how to perform CPR. It was a wonderful week filled with hands-on learning, creativity, and practical skills that the young people will carry with them. Have a great weekend. Mr Noone.

Figge Class

People always say 'begin each day with a smile' and that is exactly what I get every morning teaching in Figge class;

from the moment our young people step through the doors, there is always a tale to tell, a story to share or some world event that needs unpicking. It is within the first 20 minutes of each day where the day is set, the mood is felt and the troubles are eased. This week, we started most days with a PSHE focus, however, these lessons have turned into very productive and much needed chats on various topics. We had a great Wednesday session discussing insecurities and why you should never change to suit someone else. Tuesday was spent deliberating thoughts we should keep to ourselves and the phrase 'if you can't say anything nice, don't say anything at all'.

It is sometimes easy to overlook the small wins, but this week I have seen the young people step up in supporting each other; I have seen them mature in their approach with others, kindness has been seen in abundance and focus in learning has been wonderful to see.

The young people have thoroughly loved our work on learning about the justice system this week; we have watched a mock trial, have posed as a witness, and written a news report using formal language.



The children really got into the trial case and even set up the Figge courtroom. They put Miss Joy on trial for a crime and a young person for burglary - it was great to see what they had learnt from the lessons and what they included in their drama.

The class had a lovely reward trip to the park this afternoon in the glorious sunshine and played co-operatively and there were smiles-a-plenty! Happy Weekend. Miss Chandler
