We had so many interesting visitors in school this week, enhancing our science, PSHE and life skills lessons. I was lucky enough to shadow her as she talked to four different groups of children throughout the school and all children showed the very best of Selwyn manners. I couldn't have been more proud of the children at Selwyn, and staff for modelling such high standards.

## **Marco Polo Class**

It's been another exciting and engaging week in Marco Polo class!

In English, we explored contemporary stories, breaking them down to understand what makes them engaging before writing our own gripping introductions. Maths introduced algebra, where we learned how to represent addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division using algebraic notation. In computing, we focused on internet safety, particularly how to identify fake profiles and check for reliable information online. History took us back to the 16th century as we learned about the events that led to the start of the Spanish Armada and geography sparked curiosity as we asked and investigated key questions about extreme environments. In science, we explored how sound travels by making and testing paper cup phones, which led to some brilliant discussions and discoveries. Life Skills involved baking delicious quiches, with everyone getting hands-on in the kitchen.

## **Okapi Class**

This week in Okapi class, it was a pleasure to welcome our young people back after the half-term break. They were eager to share stories about the activities they got up to during the break.

We kicked off the first week back with a variety of exciting and engaging activities, starting with several guest professionals who came to visit us. The Network Rail team gave an informative talk about the importance of safety around level crossings, which was very engaging for our young people. We also had a fire safety session that highlighted important precautions and safety measures, which kept everyone's attention. One of the week's highlights was the dentistry talk on Thursday, where the young people learned key tips on how to effectively brush their teeth; they were especially enthusiastic about the interactive activity, where they practiced brushing on an image of teeth, ensuring they spent two minutes brushing and paid attention to cleaning along the gum line.

In addition to these activities, we also began a new science topic focused on magnets. The young people had fun exploring the different types of surfaces that are magnetic and non-magnetic, sparking their curiosity about how magnets work in the world around them. As part of the enrichment opportunity, we are always looking for visitors to come and talk to the children, and this week, we had a talk from the railway and transport people, who educated the children in railway safety; this will prove very useful, given our close proximity to the Foxton train station and its use for school trips for the children. We also had a visit from a fire woman, who came to educate us about fire safety; for the older children, it was good to learn about having the correct chargers for devices so that they don't overheat, as well as advice about not setting fire alarms off unnecessarily and teaching them about the procedures that occur when this happens. Yesterday, we had our final visit of the week from a dental nurse and the children loved 'masking up' and getting their gloves on to clean teeth, discuss oral hygiene and find out about why dental health is important. These visitors are invaluable to the children and every visitor has said how amazing the children have been; they ask questions, listen with focus and remember what they have been told. Next week, we have an engineer in to visit.

The class have loved many learning opportunities this week; our first lesson about the Vikings, the mysteries of algebra in maths, learning about myths and characters in English, learning to play a Bruno Mars track on the keyboard for music, working out confusing time zones in geography and learning about the life on Malala Yousef in RE.

Part of this, they said, was remembering never to set the fire alarm off falsely, for a number of reasons: people may become complacent if they hear the alarm on a regular basis, it may create panic and upset amongst others and it creates an unsafe environment. Please could you re-iterate this message to your young people at home too.

Next week, we are looking forward to welcoming an engineer into school, as we head towards science week. It is wonderful to have more people starting to see the super learning opportunities the young people have and to be part of their wider learning, as well as adding to many of their career and future aspirations.
